FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE: Integrity Biofuels opened its doors yesterday for a crowd of over 500 dignitaries, farmers and leaders from the agricultural and renewable fuel community.

Morristown, Indiana

Integrity Biofuels, central Indiana's first soy biodiesel plant opened its doors Tuesday August 1st. The response from the community and leaders in the state was overwhelming. Indiana's very own Lieutenant Governor Rebecca Skillman said "Integrity is not only good for the community but good for the state and the well being of our children's future." Skillman has long been a proponent of renewable resources and the positive backing and impact that Indiana government has given the renewable fuel industry is impressive.

America uses more than 20 million barrels of oil every day, importing almost 60%. "We want our fuel from the mid-west not the middle-east." stated Fletcher Hall Executive Director of the American Trucking Association's Agriculture & Food Transporters Conference. "We have to take charge today" said Indiana's Agriculture Director Andy Miller. Chris Novak, Executive Director of the Indiana Soybean Board and agreed and stated "It's up to the citizens to urge our schools to use Biodiesel in their buses and urge our gas stations to provide both Soy Biodiesel and Ethanol at our pumps. State Officials say that Indiana will become the Nations leader in renewable fuel production. The program ended with tours of the new facility and lunch.

Integrity Biofuels Back ground

Charles (Shorty) and John Whittington the founders and President and Vice-President of Integrity Biofuels also know trucking. Charles Whittington is nationally known in the trucking industry as the founder of Grammer Industries, a firm specializing in hauling anhydrous ammonia and as a Vice Chairman in the American

After toying with the idea of getting into renewable fuels, The Whittington's did the research, purchased the location, and came up with an automation system that is the finished product you see today.

Hauling their first tanker full of fuel this week Integrity Biofuels has an all new design to the industry and has a patent pending. They will run twenty-four hours a day with no emissions and no waste water. Using the premium bean oil produced by Bungee, a neighbor in the Morristown Industrial park, Integrity plans to produce 5 million gallons per year. Plans to double and even triple their plant are in the near future.
